We evolve, adjust and we embrace risk, and we teach our pupils to do the same. At the heart of our vision, to ensure all pupils are inspired, challenged and making progress every day, there is a determination to make sure that all pupils, irrespective of their backgrounds and starting points, are given the best possible start in life through a Bede's education. So if we cannot say that every pupil is challenged (i.e. doing something difficult), then we must surely have failed in our duty as educators. The journey through Nursery, Pre-Prep and Prep School, is full of fundamental steps, learning new skills, making new friendships, experiencing setbacks, trying again, succeeding, failing. Our aim is to develop all pupils into passionate, curious, independent, happy and ambitious children, who are confident with healthy self esteem and able to deal with life's ups and downs. Sometimes fear of failure can dissuade us from making a beginning, but we must push ourselves outside of our comfort zones, and remember that great achievements involve great risk. In order to raise pupil's

aspirations and improve outcomes, we must encourage all of our pupils to try new things. As J.K Rowling rightly says, "It is impossible to live without failing at something, unless you live so cautiously that you might as well not live at all. In which case, you've failed by default" and that goes for us teachers, too.

By the time pupils reach the end of Year 8, it is our aim that they have been successfully prepared for their next big challenge, moving on to their senior school, and this doesn't happen without high-performing teachers, working in a school that's established a culture of high expectations, aspirations, and motivation. In short, if you lead a school that is outstanding, you need to empower your staff to take risks, be more autonomous and ambitious.

On the following pages, you will see some of the amazing teaching and learning that has been happening at Bede's Prep this term. I wish you all a fantastic summer holiday, and I look forward to welcoming you all back in the Autumn Term.

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PUPILS REACH FINALS OF WICKED YOUNG WRITER AWARDS

The Summer Term has been a busy and successful one!

Inevitably, it marked the end of year examinations and progress tests when pupils have put their reading and writing skills to practice. It was a memorable moment to see Year 8 pupils gather together in the chapel to receive their Common Entrance grades from the Headmaster. Their outstanding results reflect the hard work and commitment the pupils have invested in their work. We are proud of them all and know they are well equipped and prepared for the next stage of their educational journey.

The term also marked national success in writing. Towards the end of June, four of our talented writers attended the finalists' ceremony at the Wicked Young Writers Awards at the Apollo Theatre in London. Will (Year Eight), Humreen (Year Six), Nell (Year Six) and Seb (Year Two) were selected as finalists in their age category. This year was one of the most highly contested awards since it began in 2010, with nearly 5,000 entries submitted in the national competition.

The Wicked Young Writer Awards have reported that the quality of the entries this year is excellent so being selected as one of the 20 finalists in their category is a huge achievement.

The judges, including best-selling authors Cressida Cowell and Michael Morpurgo, joined our finalists at the Awards ceremony in London on 20 June when they announced the winner of each age category. Congratulations to our four finalists, in particular Humreen was announced as the winner of the 8-10 age category with her story 'Trapped'.

As Cressida Cowell revealed to the audience when she announced Humreen as the winner, this story has an amazing twist that must be appreciated in its reading.





The ceremony was a truly moving and remarkable experience that celebrated the power and positivity of young people's writing. But rather than me write about it, Humreen has recounted her experience of the day:

"I was standing inside the Apollo Theatre in London. Me a finalist! I couldn't believe that it was real. In a couple of hours, the judges were going to announce the winner of the 8-10 age category. After what felt like hours, the doors opened.

"Flocks of people rushed inside and I felt quite cramped. Once I got the tickets, we came to a main room. Camera men and women took pictures of the finalists. After photos were taken, we were directed to the stalls. I was very nervous.

"After the workshop, the ceremony took place. By now, sweat was beading on my forehead and my heart was palpitating very fast. When the actor was speaking about my category, my palms were caked in sweat. When Cressida Cowell announced the runner up, my heart sank. I was not going to win so I was hoping to get runner up. When she announced the winner, I was shocked. They announced my name!

"My legs turned to jelly. I got up for my seat and ran across to the steps. I couldn't stop smiling. I could barely climb the stairs and I wobbled onto the stage. I sat down next to the judges. Looking at my parents, both of them with a proud look of their faces, I felt incredible. My nerves had subsided only to be replaced with pride. "I half believed that it wasn't real, it felt so incredible. To be a finalist and to win my first competition was amazing. I loved the experience and I'll definitely enter again."

An academic year has passed and already preparations for the next have begun in earnest: authors for Book Week are being booked and schemes of work are being prepared to challenge, enthuse and be relevant to the changing world around us. It is an exciting time.

SCIENTISTS LEARN BY DOING

There was much excitement in the science lab this term when we studied ecosystems, food chains and habitats with different year groups.

The school pond, dug earlier this year, has been a great asset to the teaching of science. The children loved using hand lenses and binocular microscopes to identify the organisms that have quickly colonised the new pond. The digital camera for the microscopes, purchased by the Friends of Bede's Prep, made it easy for the children to



share the images of the organisms they had identified with their peers.

Year 6 spent time at the Thinktank museum in Birmingham as part of their residential trip. They enjoyed visiting the planetarium and participating in a number of activities to reinforce some basic ideas about space.

Meanwhile some members of Year 8 attended the Salters' Festival of Science at the University of Brighton. Their practical



and investigative skills were tested as they were set some challenging investigations in the university chemistry laboratories. One task involved trying to lower the temperature of a beaker of water by 10.5 degrees in one minute using only citric acid and bicarbonate of soda.

A BUSY TERM FOR BEDE'S MATHEMATICIANS

Year 2 have been learning about 2D shapes and 3D solids recently.

This activity started with the children discussing and naming some 3D solids. The children were asked to make a cube and square based pyramid. Discussions were had about how many edges, vertices and faces each solid has and if there are any patterns. The children explored which 2D polygons were needed to create a 3D solid and how they created a net. A challenge was then set for children to find as many nets as possible which could be used to create a 3D solid. This use of concrete materials aids the children when learning new language and concepts in an authentic way.



Meanwhile, pupils from Year 8 and Year 9 competed in the UK Mathematics Trust regional team challenge. Two teams entered, with each team consisting of two Year 8 and two Year 9 pupils. The challenge comprised of a team round, relay round, crossword puzzle and shuttle round. It was a fantastic event where the best mathematical minds in East Sussex come together. Our two teams achieved 6th and 10th place out of the 15 teams entered from the county. We are immensely proud of the teams' efforts on the day.

A tour round the factory, and a trip through the history of the cocoa bean and how it became the 'glass and a half' chocolate we all know and love was very interesting. The highlight of the day for all of the children was the individual cup of melted chocolate they were given and the visit to the largest chocolate shop in the world.

Mr Fasciolo-Barnes would have been pleased to hear how much mental arithmetic went on as the children worked out exactly how many chocolate bars they could afford with their pocket money.



Back at our accommodation, the children teamed up for our evening activities: orienteering and a campfire with songs, as well as making our own toast and hot chocolate around the fire.

Wednesday was our third and final day, and began with packing, stripping beds and tidying rooms. The destination today was Warwick Castle, and a chance to see what we could remember from our History lessons. I am proud to say that during the trebuchet talk the Bede's pupils gave most of the answers.



Reflecting on why this trip was so important of course the education benefits are clear, but it is perhaps those skills learnt that our not so obvious that are even more so. Being away from home - perhaps for the first time - developing independence, extending their understanding and knowledge of the world, and improving their social skills through working as part of a team all made this trip a fantastic opportunity for our Year 6 pupils.

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YEAR 7 INVESTIGATE COASTAL EROSION AT BIRLING GAP

In the Summer Term, Year 7 children at Bede's Prep study coasts in their geography lessons.

The first geography lesson of the term saw Year 7 visit Birling Gap to investigate coastal erosion and management.

Natascha Sharma, National Trust Community and Learning Ranger, delivered an interesting and thought-provoking talk for our pupils. They learnt why the cliffs at Birling Gap erode so quickly, the importance of the area in terms of tourism and wildlife and the current management strategies to protect the downland and respond to coastal erosion. In groups, the children then engaged in a fact-finding mission in the visitor centre to discover more about the geology of the area and the history of erosion. Following this, the children visited the beach to look for signs of weathering and cliff retreat.

The children discovered how many coastal cottages have been demolished over time, and the discovery of wave-eroded chunks of concrete and garden walls increased the appreciation that some major changes have taken place to the landscape.

GEOGRAPHERS ENJOY AN OLYMPIC DAY OUT

This term, Year 8 visited the Queen Elizabeth Olympic Park in Stratford, East London as part of their studies of settlements.

This was chosen as it is perhaps the finest example of urban regeneration in the country in recent years, and one which has sustainability at its heart. Despite not knowing much about the area of the Lower Lea Valley before its transformation, many of the pupils had a sense that they were exploring a very special area; indeed several commented on how it was hard to believe that they were so close to the centre of London.

We enjoyed an informative guided tour around the park learning all about the changes that had taken place, and how the area was constantly developing. The children all said they would love to return



to explore the Olympic venues including the Aquatic Centre and the Velodrome!

In a follow-up lesson, the children discovered what the area was like prior to regeneration by conducting an Environmental Quality survey based on photographic evidence of the industrially derelict area. This further helped them to appreciate just how much and how successfully the area had been transformed and improved socially, economically and environmentally.
