I have never believed that a clever child should be defined purely along the lines of the traditional notion of intelligence based on IQ. The false idea of this then being fixed is equally unhelpful, and the subject for a blog at a later date.

The reason I raise how we define success at school is indeed linked to the notion of multiple intelligences. Dr Howard Gardner back in 1983 expressed the compelling argument that our education system focused most of its attention on linguistic and logical-mathematical intelligence. Dr Gardner, and incidentally, we here at Bede's, believe that we should also pay close attention and celebrate those pupils with other intelligences: the artists, musicians, designers, dancers, sports boys and girls, therapists, entrepreneurs, and others who enrich our school community hugely. This Autumn Term newsletter aims to showcase how our teachers plan and present their subjects in a wide variety of ways using music, cooperative learning, art, drama, play, multimedia, information technology, field trips, beach visits, inner reflection and much more. Also how our pupils take every opportunity through an expansive co-curricular activities and clubs programme to develop the wide range of intelligences from linguistic intelligence, spatial, kinaesthetic, musical, inter and

intrapersonal, and naturalist intelligences, in addition to being outstanding at maths and reasoning. I do hope you enjoy the following pages.

The growth of technology has made a huge impact on the way pupils learn, opening innovative and exciting possibilities for education to realise the full potential of our children. 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STUDIES OF SCIENCE

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REMEMBERING THE FALLEN



Last summer we were asked as a school to be involved with a project run by our local Meads church St John's.

With a lottery grant, they were looking to rebuild their clock tower which had been destroyed during World War II. The project - which involved researching the names of those local boys and men on their memorial board who had died during World War I - would culminate in a week-long festival of remembrance to coincide with 100 years since of the end of the First World War. Children from the Prep School contributed by working on a variety of projects across a number of departments including Music, Art, English and History.

The Year 7 children learnt about World War I from how it began and recruitment, to trench warfare, food and conditions. In their history and English lessons, children concentrated on war poetry and writing their own definitive guides to life in the trenches. In art, they studied war paintings and created amazing poppies out of a variety of mediums to be used to decorate the church for the festival.

In music, pupils took part in a musical morning at the church in front of members



of the public.

As a school we launched a 'Thank You' competition in line with the British Legions' own competition. The children across the school used music, art or English to design their own thank you's to the fallen of World War I. All of the competition entries were displayed in the church and the winners received their prizes from the Lord Lieutenant of East Sussex at a special tea



party held at the church on Remembrance Sunday.

The whole school participated in a special service of remembrance on the Friday before Remembrance Sunday. The church pulpit was covered in a carpet of the children's poppies, beautifully decorated by Ms Armitage and provided a stunning centre piece to this moving ceremony.

On Saturday morning there was a service to remember the names of the fallen. Children from the school gave performed musical solos and poetry readings as well as reading out their research on the two names on the board who were also Bede's pupils; Guy Henry Wallis Foreman and Alan Hayes Oxley. The children from across the school found the whole project interesting and absorbing.

FOSSIL HUNTERS

Year 6 pupils from Bede's Prep School had to present in a creative way one of the great geological mysteries; how fossils of sea creatures were found high up in the Himalayas.

There was some stunning work produced including 3D posters, papier mache models of mountains, homemade videos, a huge Mount Everest cake and even a rap video!



Year 5 had the task over half term of creating a shoebox model, or diorama, of either a rainforest or desert scene, as part of their studies of biomes. Given just a few ideas, they really took this idea to heart and again, produced some incredible work. Part of my classroom is now a riot of colour, dense vegetation, exotic and dangerouslooking wildlife all carefully researched and beautifully and imaginatively presented. 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AN AERIAL VIEW



A professional qualification in flying drones is just one of the latest exciting opportunities being offered to Bede's Prep pupils on a Wednesday afternoon.

Prep bus driver Roy is a professional commercial pilot; he's been flying drones commercially for 15 years and has travelled all over the world. Roy has very generously offered his time and expertise to teach pupils in Years 6, 7 and 8 the basic flying manoeuvres and safety aspects of flying.

"There is a big safety aspect to this and pupils must fully understand the legal requirements as well as keeping themselves and the general public safe" says Roy.

The first two sessions started in the classroom, where pupils became familiar with the UK Dronecode which assists drone users to fly safely. After that pupils will be given the exciting opportunity to learn how to fly the drone. Not only that, but Roy has also offered to support pupils to gain their Unmanned Aircraft Qualification (UAQ). This is a professional qualification which is acknowledged by the Civil Aviation Authority and marks the beginning of a series of qualifications which lead to a commercial license.

As well as being able to make safe basic manoeuvres pupils will also be taught how to video and take photographs using the drone. Elspeth in Year 8 is especially excited about the opportunity to widen her art portfolio with aerial photographs. "Roy's lessons are really thorough and he is making sure we know how to use the drones safely. I love photography but I've never done this before. I can't wait to get started and get outside to start flying."

As the Christmas spirit took hold, our Year 8 choristers took part in a 'Carolathon' at

Langney Shopping Centre. The event was organised by Demelza, a local charity that provides specialist care and support



to children with terminal illnesses and their families. Throughout the day, many different choirs took part, and Bede's was proud to continue its support for this very special charity whilst also performing some seasonal songs for the people of Eastbourne.

This has been a memorable season in many ways, with football contact time increased significantly.

This means almost twice as many matches in a season, and - although it is early days - we are optimistic that this will further prepare our pupils for training at higher levels as they move up to the Senior School.
